

Members of the South Fork Fishing and Hunting club who were also Knights Templar of the Grand Commandery of Pennsylvania

Robert Pitcairn, a member of Mountain Lodge No. 281 was knighted November 10, 1858

Benjamin Franklin Ruff, The floral offerings were profuse and tasteful. They came from Lodge No. 484 A.Y.M., of which he was a member, and from the Knights Templar, to which he belonged

Benjamin Parke, knighted July 13, 1855

George H. Christy knighted October 12, 1864

Elias J. Unger, knighted February 23, 1860

Other prominent Masons in the club:

Henry Clay Frick, Treasurer of King Solomon Lodge No. 346 in Connellsville. A year later he joined the Urania Chapter No. 192 at Greensburg. By 1880 he would achieve the highest orders of the York Rite – the Orders of the Knights of Rose Croix, the Knights of Malta, and Knights Templar. Later was a member of Bronx Masonic Temple 1910.

James W. Brown, Grand Master of Masons of Pennsylvania in 1904-5.

Hilary D. Brunot, Worshipful Brother Brunot was installed as Dunn's Rock's fifteenth Master on July 29th, 1906,

John Caldwell Jr., Born N. I. son of Presbyterian Minister a director of the Masonic Bank he was a Scottish Rite Mason and a member of the Loyal Legion.

Aaron French, was a Whig in politics and became a strong Republican. He was a Free Mason director of Masonic Bank. In addition to the South Fork Fishing and Hunting Club, he was a member of the Duquesne Club. He and his wife attended the Calvary Episcopal Church of Pittsburgh.

Americus Vespucius Holmes, While young, he got to know many of Pittsburgh's movers and shakers through the Free Masons.

John Davidson Hunt, was also a member of the Pittsburgh Commandery and Knights Templar.

Philander Chase Knox Knox was a member of Fellowship Lodge No. 679 in Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania.

John Jacob "J.J." Lawrence, was a director of the Masonic Bank, along with South Fork Fishing and Hunting Club members Robert Pitcairn, E.A. Myers, Aaron French, and John Caldwell.

Andrew William Mellon, was initiated to the Scottish Rite Freemasonry, till he raised the 33rd and highest degree

Dr. David Nevin Rankin, was a member of many organizations including: the State and Allegheny County Medical Societies for his entire professional practice; Laryngological Association; the Masonic fraternity for over sixty years

James Hay Reed, He is a member of the Pitts-burgh Chamber of Commerce, and of the Credit Mens Association. Fraternally he holds membership in the Free and Accepted Masons

James Hays Willock, He was a thirty-two degree Mason, a Knight-Templar and Shriner, and a member of many other Masonic orders.
